



Our School Vision : At St George's we are proud to be one family of lifelong learners who know they are special to God. Our family is built upon a strong sense of belonging and mutual respect. Our community gives our children the freedom to flourish and succeed.

Literacy:

The children will be reading '**Varjak Paw**' by **SF Said**, a story about a kitten who leaves his family home to embark on frightening adventures, meeting a range of different characters. The story is an exciting blend of mystery and mysticism. The children will be discussing the meaning of the story, exploring narrative plot, settings, characters and drawing inferences to aid understanding. They will also be writing recounts in role, writing newspaper reports based on the narrative and composing a narrative written from another character's point of view. There is a real focus on the vocabulary used in the story and the importance of understanding words in context. Within our Literacy sessions, the children will explore different authors' writing styles, allowing them to develop their spelling, punctuation and grammar skills to use in their own writing. Alongside the texts the children will be reading in their Literacy lessons, the children will also be engaging with a variety of diverse texts within our guided reading sessions and during our daily story times. The children will also have the opportunity to share their love and passion of reading throughout the half term.

Mathematics: The children will develop their grasp of **number facts, fluency in place value, addition and subtraction**, and appropriate use of **mathematical vocabulary** to solve problems, reason, think logically and work systematically. Through our Mastery approach, they will develop their own **mathematics cultural capital** to better make sense of the world around them and become successful lifelong learners. We will start the year looking at **place value** where we will develop an understanding of **numbers beyond 1000**, negative numbers, Roman numerals to C (100) and solve practical and number problems. We will go on to look at the operations of **addition and subtraction**. We will be teaching the **formal column methods** for solving calculations, using numbers with up to 4 digits. We will also solve addition and subtraction two-step problems in contexts, deciding which operations and methods to use and learn to reason why. We will have weekly **timed, multiplication tests** to encourage and motivate the children to have rapid recall of multiplication tables.

Science:

This half term our science unit is **Living things and their habitats**. In this unit children will be answering the question **How can we tell the difference between living things?** The children will be learning about how living things can be grouped together in a variety of ways. The children will understand the ways environments can be affected by change. They will also be learning about food chains, making observations and collecting information in a variety of ways. We will be looking at **Carl Linnaeus** who developed the classification system that is still used today.

RE:

Our unit in RE this half term is **Creation**. We will be exploring how Christians learn from the Creation story. By the end of the unit children are expected to describe what Christians do to show they believe God is the creator. We will make links between Genesis 1 and what Christians believe about God, ask questions and suggest answers about what might be important in the creation story for Christians living today.

Computing:

The children will apply their knowledge and understanding of networks. They will learn that the World Wide Web is part of the internet, and be given opportunities to explore the World Wide Web for themselves to learn about who owns content and what they can access, add, and create. Finally, they will evaluate online content to decide how honest, accurate, or reliable it is, and understand the consequences of false information.

History:

This half-term, we will be learning about the Ancient Egyptians. In this unit children will be answering the question **What contribution did the Ancient Egyptians make to modern society?** The children will find out about the culture of the Ancient Egyptians and how they lived, the influence of their beliefs, prominent individuals and how they communicated. We are aiming to reflect on the legacy that the Ancient Egyptians left for today's society. Additionally, the children will take part in a Workshop where they will take part in interactive storytelling of the Gods and their rivalries, starring Ra, Thoth, Isis, Osiris and Set and others, as taken from Ancient Egyptian myth and legend. They will also create tomb space using tables, with paper sheets, onto which the children will write and draw protective spells in hieroglyphs from the Book of the Dead, followed by the class going on a Pharaoh's funeral procession around the school, carrying a replica Middle Kingdom coffin, accompanied by wailing, dirging and clashing cymbals, prior to then entombing our Pharaoh in his 'tomb!'

DT:

The children will work towards making their own **pop-up books**. They will learn how different card mechanisms create different sorts of movement, about the accurate cutting, scoring, folding and joining techniques needed to produce working, reliable card Mechanisms, to develop different graphic styles and match these to the needs of different audiences and to match card mechanisms to the movements they want to achieve in their book.

PSHE:

The children will be reflecting upon the word '**Community**' and considering what it means to be a part of one, different types of community and the benefits of belonging to them. They will also be setting goals for themselves and learning about showing compassion to others and caring for those in need. We will be discussing our school virtue, **fellowship** and thinking about what it means to us all. In order to celebrate the diverse community we have at St George's, each classroom will have a **Cultural Heritage** display, where the children can share ideas about their backgrounds.

Modern Foreign Language (MFL) Spanish

This half term the children will be learning the days of the week in Spanish and working on simple high frequency verbs. They will also be working on a Spanish story and learning some songs to help build their vocabulary in Spanish.

Spanish is taught through the use of familiar and/or authentic high quality texts, songs and videos, giving pupils the opportunity to explore similarities and differences between the Spanish and English language, whilst learning about the richness of the countries, peoples, religions, traditions and cultures of the Spanish Speaking world.

Music:

This half term the children will be learning about the British composer **Edward Elgar** (1857-1934) and listening to the Enigma variations. The children will listen and reflect on a piece of orchestral music, use tuned percussion instruments to learn to play a tune, create pieces inspired by Elgar, perform as an ensemble. They will also begin to learn simple staff notation and learn musical language appropriate to the tasks. They will continue to listen to and develop an appreciation for a wide variety of music from different genres and historical periods.

PE:

The children will have lessons in netball, where they will learn to be able to apply basic shooting techniques, develop netball skills, marking and foot work and demonstrate and implement some basic rules. In Badminton they will learn to explore different shots with both forehand and backhand, to demonstrate different badminton skills and practise trick shots in isolation.

4MW have PE on Tuesday and Wednesday, 4C have PE on Tuesday and Thursday.

Homework:

Your child will be given a St George's Home Learning Menu, where some of the learning is essential and some is optional. Homework will be set on a Friday and the essential homework is due on a Wednesday. We will be using the following online platforms to support home learning: MyMaths, TimesTable Rockstars, Spelling Frame. All relevant login details will be sent home inside the children's Reading Records.

Please encourage your child to try some of the optional homework on the Home Learning Menu. Our aim is to encourage children to take their research and learning in a direction that they would like to and to present it to their peers in the classroom so it can be celebrated.

Reading Books:

Please read with your child for at least 15 minutes each day. Children do not have to read a whole book; a few pages are often enough. Please question your child about their understanding of the text.

We would be grateful if you could ensure that your child's reading record is signed once a week and brought into school on a Wednesday for us to check.

When reading with your child please take the opportunity to build their speaking and listening skills by engaging in conversations about the story that is being read.

Other: What you need and when:

Please ensure all school uniform, water bottles, bags, coats and PE kits are clearly named. Please provide your child with a warm, waterproof coat and a named water bottle **every day**. Please also remember to apply sun tan lotion in the warmer weather. It would help us if children could bring a box of tissues in at the beginning of term. Please also ensure that your child has spare pants/socks in their bags – accidents can happen! Apron: Please ensure your child has an apron in school (an old adult shirt will do)
